Bible Readings for this Sunday

Old Testament: Genesis 7 New Testament: Acts 2 v. 42-47 Gospel Reading: John 10 v.1-10

Reflection on today's gospel reading

This Sunday is called *Good Shepherd Sunday* owing to the Gospel appointed for today, in which Christ likens Himself to a shepherd and ourselves to His flock.

Sheep are sociable creatures, often seeming to move as one great mass when in huge flocks – in the shared community of the flock sheep provide each other with protection from predators and seem to operate a largely egalitarian structure with social hierarchy being quite subtle (far more so than in a herd of cows): A 'lost sheep' separated from the herd may often panic and stumble into danger. They really aren't designed for self isolation or social distancing. These are animals who live together, move together, and exist together. These are the animals to which Christ likens His Church.

During the Reformation there was great concern about the nature of *the individual before God* – perhaps rightly so as it can be easy when in a herd to lose a sense of personal accountability. Over time however this has developed and talk of spirituality has become intensely personalised: How often do we talk of 'My faith', 'My prayer', 'My God' as if this is something we're doing all on our own? Consider also the hymns and worship songs written in the *I* form (*My Jesus, My Saviour; My God, I love thee not because...;* etc) with those written as *We* (*We have a Gospel to proclaim; We sing the praise of Him who died;* and so forth) – what do they say about our understanding of worship and what it is to be a church?

There is a difference between an act of collective worship and a collection of acts of worship. At the moment we are still able to participate in the latter. On our own and with our households we can still pray,

read scripture, sing and be aware of God's presence, however the sledgehammer realisation of lockdown is that even if we are able to connect by telephone or online we are still separated from the larger flock: 'Virtual Church' is exactly that; *virtual* and the reality of the truly collective worship which binds us together as a flock continues to be denied to us: We feel *out of communion* with one another – How can we be one body when we cannot partake in one bread?

As we may have observed during Lent, and as our Muslim friends are now experiencing in Ramadan, one of the effects of fasting is a greater appreciation of that which is denied. Now as we are denied the intimacy and fellowship of the flock perhaps we will emerge from lockdown with a renewed appreciation for our collective worship, gathered community and the connections which bind us as churches and as a team. Keep us, good Lord under the shadow of your mercy in this time of uncertainty and distress. Sustain and support the anxious and fearful, and lift up all who are brought low; that we may rejoice in your comfort knowing that nothing can separate us from your love in Christ Jesus our Lord. Amen.

Lord Jesus Christ, you taught us to love our neighbour and to care for those in need as if we were caring for you. In this time of anxiety, give us strength to comfort the fearful, to tend the sick, and to assure the isolated of our love, and your love, for your name's sake. Amen.
