## Reflection

*"Mrs Dalloway said she would buy the flowers herself."*

Mrs Dalloway (in Virginia Woolf's novel of the same name) is incredibly anxious about the party she's planning. Vanessa Redgrave plays this beautifully in the film adaptation, grating out 'Won't you come to my parrteeeee' to all and sundry with such desperate angst that you know that if the intended guests don't come to her party, and enjoy themselves, and have the perfect night she has been dreaming of, then her world will end and all will be ruin. Imagine if she had been in the position of the former boss of a friend of mine who organised a works-night out in a brewery which had zero attendance (draw your own conclusions on that one!!)

Many of us get quite stressed when organising an event – a party, a banquet, a fundraiser or even an act of public worship! Often the source of our anxiety can be attributed to our *expectations* of the event – our success criteria are based on how we can visualise the end product and we perceive any possible deviation

from that image as failure: If you plan an event and envisage a room full of people how would you feel if, when the event takes place, the people in the room are *not the people you had initially imagined*?

We often take this sense of failure (whether founded or misplaced) not only as a reflection on our planning, but on ourselves – Western ideology conditions us to value *control* and if our actions bring about an outcome we had not planned then we may well be psychologically predisposed to read this as a personal reflection. What happens when our church events and services don't go as planned - When they don't meet the vision we've had for them? Who does this reflect on?: The clergy? Volunteers? Local community? God? And what success criteria are using to judge this?: Numbers of attendees? Money taken?

One of the lessons of 2020 is that planning ahead can often prove utterly futile – we may have to close our doors, restrict numbers, or self-isolate at a moment's notice, and yet this doesn't seem to have diminished the sheer administrative weight of *planning*: Risk assessments, reopening plans, contingency plans, continuity plans – and that greatest of bureaucratic behemoths, the APCM: When we look back on the past year with a view to steering our churches' future directions in mission and ministry.

The APCM is one of the instruments by which we lay our banqueting table – if our church is to be (like the King's Banquet in Matthew 22) an Earthly metaphor for God's Kingdom, we must prepare the dinner and slaughter the fat calves (figuratively speaking). We must send out the invitations and open the doors. But what images do we have in our minds of the 'end product'? Our personal 'vision' of a successful church? ... And in a year, five years, longer, what's realistically the likelihood of our churches, and our Team Ministry, matching up with the pictures we've painted in our own heads?

Like the King in the parable, we cannot determine whom God will send through our doors in the years to come, and we cannot pre-empt their gifts or their needs. The churches God intends us to grow into are unlikely to resemble the vain edifices we might wish them to be: And how will we react when we see God's intentions diverging from our own? Will we feel we are failing? Will we blame the 'failures' on others and steamroller in our own agendas?

Perhaps it doesn't help that we have bought in so doctrinally to the very Western relationship between 'Leadership' and 'Control'. We talk about 'Christian Leadership' as a license to form our own *vision, drive, direction, strategy*... But are those really ours' to lead with? Or are these the areas where Christ leads and we must be followers?

Our mission is to prepare the room, open the doors and dispatch the invitations: We may be tasked with buying the flowers but it is God who will host the party. Rev'd Edward
